Some of you may have noticed that in recent years our clergy team has selected an annual theme for the High Holy Days.

We have chosen

each theme to emphasize that every High Holy Day season is unique. Our society is not the same as it was a year ago. Each of us has grown, learned, changed, laughed, cried, celebrated, aged. How, then, can this Rosh Hashanah be a mere repetition of the same prayers we offered last year? Rather, it should be a new opportunity to consider the state of our world and our selves. So too this Yom Kippur should not be a rote re-hashing of the same tired confessions, but a new opportunity to take stock of who and what we have become.

This High Holy Day season, especially, we desperately need to step outside of our routine so that we can experience the most essential of human emotions: Wonder, Hope and Awe.

Wonder

There is no question that we are among the most fortunate human beings on earth. Nonetheless all of us lose sight of the many miracles of our existence, much like the Jews of legend who walked through the miraculous walls of water complaining of the mud and muck on their shoes. Each of us yearns to experience appreciation and gratitude for God's many blessings. We ache to marvel at the beauty of the earth and the gorgeous spectacle that is our lives. In short, we desperately long for Wonder. As theologian Rabbi Abraham Joshua Heschel taught, "The beginning of our happiness lies in the understanding that life without wonder is not worth living."

We have each experienced disappointment, disillusion, failure and loss. Our people has likewise suffered communally in every generation. In fact, one wonders why we didn't give up long ago. Rabbi Joseph Potasnik, executive vice president of the New York Board of Rabbis, reminds us of the centrality of hope in Jewish law. "If I lose an object and I do not give up hope of it being found, then it still belongs to me. However if I lose something and relinquish all hope,

then the "finders keepers" rule applies and it now belongs to the new owner." Simply put, no matter how bad the situation gets, the greatest of all Jewish values and the highest of all Jewish aspirations is Hope. We will gather on these High Holy Days to affirm that despite everything we will continue to put one foot in front of the other because this New Year will be a better year.

Awe

Although we sometimes call the High Holy Days the "Days of Awe," we might be at a loss to define Awe itself. The Hebrew word *yir'ah* connotes a combination of reverence and fear. Each of us can instantly recall that indescribable feeling we get when we hear the call of the shofar or the tune of Kol Nidrei. That just might be the sound of Awe itself, passed down to us through the generations. To experience Awe is to acknowledge that there is a power beyond human capacity and understanding that sustains all life, determines truth, and defines love. Awe enables us to experience grandeur, humility, and the ineffable ecstasy and sadness of human existence.

May each of us find what we so desperately need this High Holy Day season. May these be days of Wonder, Hope and Awe.



TEMPLE ISRAEL WELCOMES THE GOVER TORAH: ALL ITS PATHS ARE PEACE



We all know about the Ten Commandments. But did you know there are 603 additional commandments, or mitzvot, outlined in the Torah?

The last commandment, number 613, instructs every Jew to write a Torah himself, or to have one written. Very few of us are aware of this obligation, or even give a thought to the provenance of our congregation's Torah scrolls.

Alan Gover, a lawyer from Greenwich, Conn., was aware of this last obligation. He decided to



not only undertake the mandate, but also to share the fruits of his labor with Temple Israel.

Now, the majestic Gover Torah, emblazoned with the burnt red, ochre and gold flame graces Temple Israel's ark. Its hand-woven mantle is embroidered in gold thread with a verse from Proverbs, "Its ways are ways of pleasantness and all its paths are peace."

The act of commissioning the Torah, Gover explained, was to celebrate his marriage to his wife, Janine Behrman, and to honor their children.

"Having a Torah written was a uniquely special experience and journey," said Gover. The process took a year and a half. It involved selecting a *sofer*, or religious scribe, procuring a variety of specialty materials and artisans as well as planning and designing the Torah, among other things.

As Gover recounted, the Torah-designing odyssey brought him to Jerusalem and the ultra-Orthodox neighborhood of *Mea She'arim*. There, a series of coincidences led him to Rabbi Shmuel Rosenfeld, a *sofer* who he enlisted to work on his family's scroll.

"There are scribes, and there are scribes," said Gover about Rosenfeld, who he describes as "highly talented," and his lettering as "vivid." Gover and Rosenfeld, originally from Brooklyn who had made *aliya*, became friends instantly.

The pair selected the parchment for the scroll, shopping around for the best



quality available. According to Gover, Rosenfeld stressed a phrase from the Torah which says that you elevate God to the highest level by always doing your best. The *sofer* worked according to that principle and aimed to bring the highest honor to God through his skill.

Armed with his quill pen, Rosenfeld expertly crafted the scroll in Assyrian script according to exacting Torah law specifications. The script on the Gover scroll seems to pop out at the reader, and the ink still appears to be wet.

"This Torah is among the most exquisite examples of scribal craftsmanship I have ever seen. It will add beauty and majesty to our worship for many years to come," said Rabbi Michael S. Friedman. "We are incredibly grateful and appreciative that the Gover family has entrusted Temple Israel with this scroll."

For Gover, commissioning the Torah was more than just a process of selection and design. "It was an experience like no other," he said, adding that having his grandson Joshua Zeitlin be the inaugural reader of the Torah at his Bar Mitzvah was "exhilarating."

"A Torah is not an artifact," explained Gover. The goal of the Torah, Gover asserted, is to make sure it inspires and does all the things it is supposed to. "We feel confident under Rabbi Friedman and Cantor Sklar our Torah will do those things at Temple Israel," Gover said.
